History before our eyes

In amongst many of our sites are remnants of the past. Some can be quite obvious to see, whilst some hide in plain sight. In the past in this bulletin we have spoken about unexploded ordnance which can be remnants of the past, but this time we are talking about archaeological features and scheduled monuments. These include earthworks, burial sites, standing stones, boundary ditches, pottery and flint. Most items will be just beneath or within the surface layer of the soil. However, some items may have been buried deeper by tree roots.

The law protects many sites, buildings and features as Scheduled Ancient Monuments. Scheduled Ancient Monuments often are surrounded by a buffer zone, either to add additional protection, or to denote the area that won't be restocked after planting.

You must find out if your site has any protected archaeological features. Your local authority archaeologist will be able to tell you if your site is designated. Welcome | ALGAO

History before our eyes – cont.

The law protects many sites, buildings and features as Scheduled Ancient Monuments.

What to look for:

- Bumps: Mounds of earth and stone may often mark archaeological sites particularly if they are of a regular shape.
- Hollows: Pits and ditches cut below the normal soil level will retain their form even when largely silted up.
- Lines: After being under plantation or other vegetation and perhaps subject to natural erosion former field boundaries may now appear as linear banks.
- Archaeological sites may have been enriched by phosphates, by mortar from crumbling walls or unusual minerals where industrial working has been carried out, they may be distinguished by a distinctive vegetation.

DO

- Stop work if you find any archaeological features and immediately contact your manager for instructions.
- Obey the advice provided by any appointed archaeologist.

DON'T

- Assume that any artefacts or features discovered are unimportant.
- X Remove any 'finds' such as coins, pottery, or bones from the site. It is illegal.
- ✓ Undertake work adjacent to areas of archaeological importance without considering if any damage may be caused.
- Drive any vehicle through a protected site..

Good Call Award

The August good call award has been presented to Richard Stevens from our Harvesting South Team.

Richard arrived on site to undertake a routine site visit when he saw the harvester and chainsaw operator working within approximately 10m of each other. He attracted the attention of both operators and discussed the purpose and importance of risk zones and the need for working outside of each others risk zone.

Thank you Richard for intervening and speaking up. With many of the HSE Fatal Incident Notifications shared by FISA relating tree felling, your intervention could have saved a life.

STOP, THINK and ACT when problems start to develop and before an incident happens.

Mental Health Awareness Day – 10th October

Mental Health doesn't just happen, positive or negative, on 10th October. It is lifelong, just like our physical health. The 10th October every year marks World Mental Health Awareness Day. This is designated by the World Health Organisation and the theme this year is Mental Health at Work.

At Tilhill we began investing in Mental Health at work in 2019 when we recruited volunteers and organised Mental Health First Aider training. We have trained many colleagues since then. However, I'm sure you wouldn't expect us to not worry about safety controls just because we have first aiders, even with +F.


In the past couple of years we have been focussing on the potential causes of poor mental health, specifically work related causes. We are complex beings and it isn't possible to totally separate our work and home selves. We would all recognise how events at work can affect mood when home, and vis-versa. Whilst we can't always influence home stresses, we can those at work. In 2022 we did our first Wellbeing Survey, with actions appearing in early 2023. We have been working through these and plan a repeat survey in 2025. Externally we have supported Mental Health Awareness days and weeks, raising awareness with our contractors. We have had contractors talk to us about their issues, and we support where possible.

Mental Health doesn't just happen, positive or negative, on 10th October. It is lifelong, just like our physical health. And just like physical health there are things we can all do to promote good health, often the same things promote good physical and mental health.
